Shining a light into the darkness

Looking back at an eventful 12 months, Peter reflects on church life and what God has said to him about faith, dignity and pastoral care and ponders what it all might mean as we enter into a new year.

Perhaps history will prove me wrong, but 2016 seemed a hugely significant 12 months.

The swing from the political middle ground to extremes, most notably the far-right; the Calais Jungle and continuing influx of refugees; Syria; Trump; Brexit. If nothing else, 2016 was certainly eventful.

As I reflect on how my own walk with God has evolved, it is clear that these events have affected my faith. I have found myself asking God what it means to be a Christian in such times, and I've repeatedly returned to the radical nature of Jesus. The gospels unite with one voice to proclaim Jesus as Lord, but they also paint a

picture of a God who does not sit still and turn a blind eye to injustice, or ignore the pleas of the desperate. It's taken a while to realise, but thankfully God is patient and generous and I'm now beginning to see the bigger picture of what my faith needs to look like in the public arena. One key element I've become aware of is the challenge of restoring dignity to people. When I look at Jesus and how he behaved both in public and in

private, he was constantly providing and restoring dignity to individuals. This was a lesson I discovered through interactions with our own church family. 2016 was a year where we said goodbye to some much-loved members - young and old. From our centenarians; Joe and Stanley, to eight-year-old Lucas. As I reflected upon their lives and particularly on how I offered pastoral care to them, God revealed the importance that providing dignity can have. Whether it was frank discussions with Joe about life and death or obliging Stanley with a full cup of beer in his preferred tankard, I discovered that the act of restoring dignity - even if just for a moment - can be a

profoundly spiritual act. In those moments we pass on something of God's grace. For we are all undignified before God - unworthy to kneel, let alone stand before the Holy Creator. Yet God acts out of love to send Jesus to the world, and through Christ our failings are forgiven and our dignity restored.

I should not have been surprised then, to learn that the key to restoring dignity is prayer. Sharing The Lord's Prayer with Joe and Stanley levelled us before God, and restored dignity to fragile bodies. The tearful prayers of confession, forgiveness and praise as Lucas was baptised reminded me that he was following a

well-trodden path, a follower of Christ in his own right - dignified before us and before his Lord. The ability to provide or restore dignity is not done in our own strength, but by God's Spirit working through us. It is a wonderfully powerful witness to God's love and grace. And it shines brightly in a world where people's dignity is being increasingly eroded. Restoring dignity is one of God's trademarks. As such it should also

be a trademark of the church. The opening of our new CAP Debt Centre is exciting as it provides examples of

how God brings dignity to individuals and families in financial despair.

The opening of *The Living Room* night shelter project is providing dignity to the homeless. I rejoice that God has placed me in a church which realises that every person matters, and creates space to involve all. But we can do more. Our challenge is to go deeper with God, to lean more heavily upon him and absorb his Word. Doing this allows us to look beyond the surface and catch a glimpse of what God sees when he looks at us: Love. Compassion. Dignity.
