We currently have five people across our congregations who are considering baptism, and so we've added another baptismal service into the diary! In addition to **August 18th** we will also be celebrating baptisms on **October 13th**.

Peter will be running another set of classes for anyone interested in September. The classes consist of three one-hour sessions which explore what baptism is, why it's important and how it links to membership of the church.

There is no pressure to be baptised at the end of the sessions.

Not sure why baptism is important?

In a nutshell, baptism is something that Jesus

commands his followers to do (Matthew 28:19). Jesus himself was baptised by being fully immersed in the River Jordan and is praised by God the Father for his obedience (Mark 1:11).

Baptism is a public declaration of our allegiance to Jesus. In doing this we also enact two important symbols:

- 1. Going under the water and rising again identifies us with Jesus and his death and resurrection (Romans 6:4).
- 2. The use of water reminds us that we are cleaned and forgiven of our sins by Jesus' sacrifice.



In the first of an occasional series, we explore the meaning behind the lyrics of a recently introduced song, starting with Phil Wickham's 'Living Hope'

Over Easter we introduced a new song to the church called 'Living Hope'.

Only released in 2018, it is proving to be a popular addition to congregation playlists both in the UK and the US, largely thanks to its singable melody and lyrics which fixate on the gospel of Jesus, our living hope.

The song picks up on the words of 1 Peter 1:3-9, where the apostle speaks of Christ having caused us to be born again into a living hope - an inheritance kept in heaven that will never fade.

The claim to have a living hope is a wondrous thing - it is not a theory, or a construct, but a person who will never die - the resurrected Jesus!

In verse one, we are given a picture of what happens when our helplessness is met by Christ's work. "Then though the darkness, your loving kindness, tore through the shadows of my soul." This powerful image is both stirring and a lead into the second verse, whereby we celebrate God coming down from heaven to rescue us.

As the chorus kicks in we are invited to respond to God's salvation with cries of 'Hallelujah!' before giving firm declarations that "You have broken every chain; there's salvation in your name; Jesus Christ, my living hope."

The final verse opens with the standout line "then came the morning that sealed the

promise" - a poetic description of the resurrection and its meaning for us, and indeed, a return to our main theme: Jesus Christ, our living hope.

The focus on one standout theme makes the song memorable, and while the melody is unmistakably modern, there is something of the classic hymn buried in there. Perhaps it's the fairly simple verse-chorus arrangement that turns its back on the complicated bridges and repeats favoured by Hillsong and the like, or perhaps it's simply a wellwritten song with clear and solid scriptural roots, that is accessible to everyday congregations.
